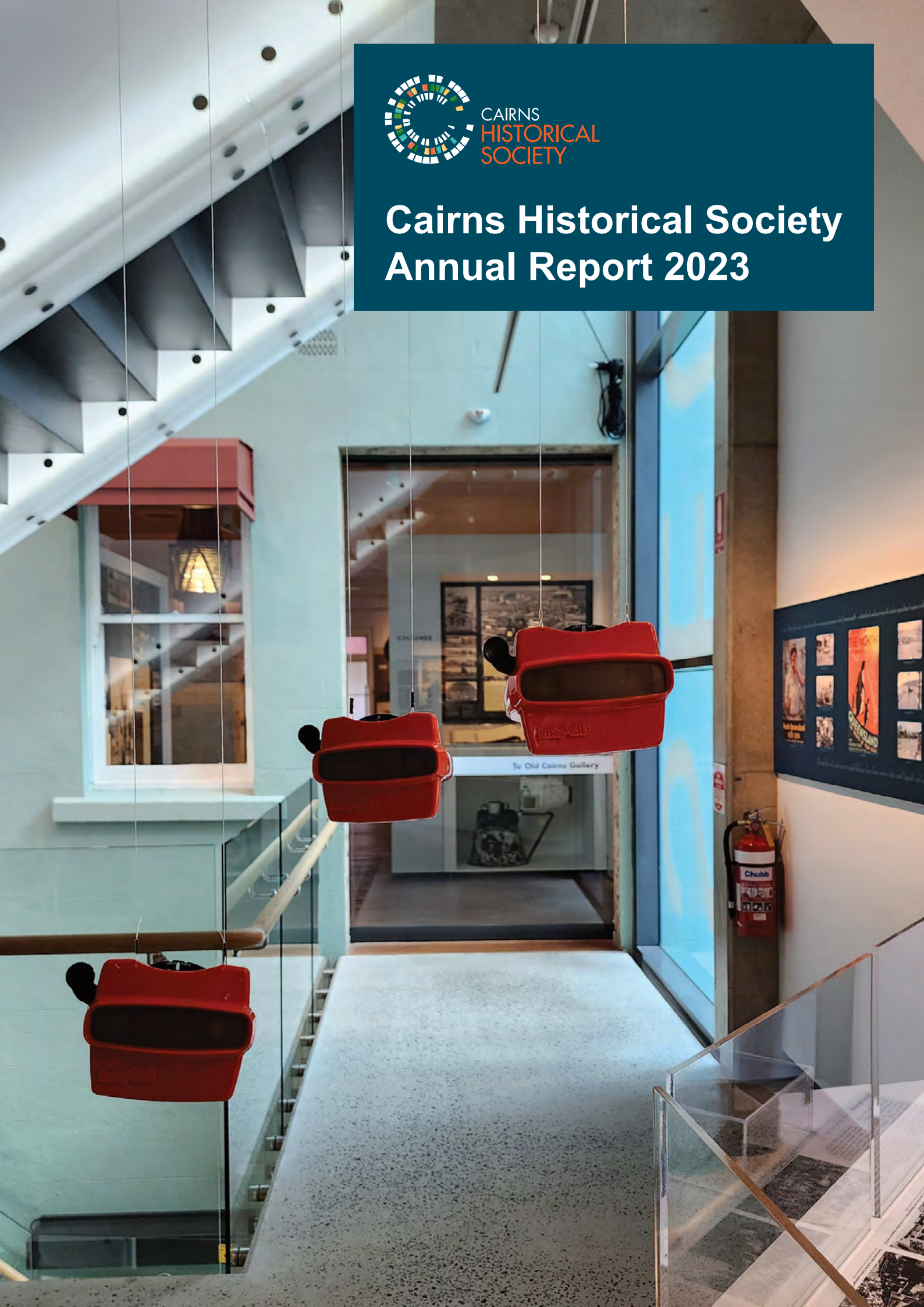

## Cairns Historical Society

The Cairns Historical Society is a community member-based organisation, created in 1958 by volunteers who shared a vision to collect, protect and make available the north's history to locals and visitors alike.

The Cairns Historical Society is highly regarded as a collecting repository and for its world class Cairns Museum and Research Centre. Our Museum showcases far north Queensland history and heritage and provides engaging visuals and stories from pre contact to post contact settlement.

Our Research Centre enables access to our extensive mixed collection of over 100,000 items in our archives, images and object collection. This makes it a significant local resource for the community and an asset of state-wide significance to Queensland.

As part of our commitment to the community, we offer intergenerational experiences about the history and heritage of the region. Through our educational and lifelong learning programs we reach out to all age groups such as the History on the Move trailer, school holiday activities and in house museum experiences.

# Our Community

Without a doubt, the heart of the Cairns Historical Society community is its members. The Society is a diverse and dedicated community of 422 members. For those who like to visit the Cairns Museum multiple times throughout the year, or participate in our School Holiday programs, a Family Membership is most popular with parents and grandparents.

Individuals who look for experience orientated memberships take our Individual Membership to participate in our social events such as Lecture Series, Gallery Openings and Meet and Memory Morning Teas. Researchers tend to take out Individual or Student Memberships to visit the Research Centre and access our extensive Collection of treasures.

None of this could happen without the Society's other members, our dedicated volunteer members who work tirelessly alongside employed staff to run both the front and back of house.

As the Society has grown into a leading research centre and community museum, changes to the way we operate have meant that some older traditional members have found it difficult to remain engaged with us.

In response to this, the Society has undertaken a review of the membership trends and benefits offered over the last five years with the aim of increasing interest and encouraging social participation from the community.

## Membership

This year we have worked hard to improve our member benefits and engage our diverse membership family.

This has included a new look newsletter for members with interesting stories and children's pages, introduction of Meet and Memories morning tea, and increased outreach to the Cairns community by partnering with CRC Libraries through our mini exhibition program.

Our new team of seven staff consists of Executive Officer/Collections Manager, Dr Sandi Robb; Second in Charge and Accounts/Marketing and Sales, Debra Ferguson; Front of House Coordinator, Shelley Cai; Curator, Dr Daniela Vávrová; Education and Life Long Learning Coordinator, Carmen Mira; Volunteer and Workplace Health and Safety Co-ordinator, Dr Sabine Mercer, and Collections Officer, Gabrielle North.

The Society is supported by 55 volunteers, with more joining all the time. They work across a range of opportunities for volunteering including in front of house and reception, as guides, education and lifelong learning hosts; and in back of house in the Research Centre where they assist in the Archives, Images, Artefact collection and Publications teams. In addition, we have a dedicated team in Collection Care at the School of Arts as well as at the Edmonton store.

# Our Operating Environment

Throughout the year, the Society has continued to deliver a premier Museum and Research Centre experience for locals, visitors and researchers alike, and it has been an incredibly busy year with many notable highlights.

One distinct feature which has impacted visitor numbers has been the return of cruise ships to the Port of Cairns. Their arrival has positively boosted the Cairns Historical Society's income, which is not at all surprising considering we have welcomed 90 cruise ships through the port since July 2022. This has kept our staff and volunteers very busy, as has the late wet season which continues to drive traffic through our doors looking for indoor activities.

Analysis of our visitor place of origin suggests that the domestic market has been strong, particularly during school holiday periods. Most of our visitors have come from Victoria, New South Wales and southern Queensland, although Western Australia has also featured strongly.

We have also actively engaged local primary and secondary schools through excursions, trailer team incursions and school holiday programming, maximising our Education and Lifelong Learning reach. The Society has worked hard to maintain its connection with the local community. We remain one of the premier places for children's activities, education, learning and family fun.

Since March 2023, the Japanese market has picked up and we are now catering to more regular school and education groups through specialised booking sites.

Our reception and guide teams have welcomed each and every young person through our doors, and the museum walls have resonated with the sound of excited children listening intently to our guides, or comparing each other's workbooks, or super sleuths results to see if they have found every hidden object.

Upstairs in the Research Centre the team have worked hard to answer queries, assist visitors on the image database and retrieve archival material. On the administrative side both the archive and image teams have been productive cataloguing, digitising, transcribing and indexing, as well as removing duplicates and sometimes triplicates from the collection.

The Collection Care team have accessioned, written significance reports, boxed, encapsulated and cared for our many objects which can be used for future displays.

We have managed to put on three excellent exhibitions throughout the year including a travelling exhibition which has shown in New York, Milan and Sydney!

What a fabulous year, achieved thanks to our dedicated team of staff and volunteers, backed by a dynamic Board.



# Our Collection

The Cairns Historical Society and Research Centre is a best practice research facility which supports a large collection of local, state and nationally significant archival, image and object items.

**217 researchers** who used the Research Centre to undertake assisted or independent discovery.



# The Research Centre

The research team received queries from far and wide via email, online, or by telephone. The new user pay system for all external research enquiries to the centre, as part of our fees and charges schedule, was implemented in July 2022 for this financial year.

Income from the Research Centre contributes to utility expenses such as electricity in our climate-controlled Collection store, purchasing industrial shelving for our Edmonton store facility, and purchasing archival quality collection materials which we require for best practice conservation standards.

Our Research Centre also provides a discreet specialist history area for families who may have hurts and shame in their backgrounds. Centred around our new Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island Collection, our centre provides a place for members of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community to seek information on their family past, as well as enquire about general regional history relating to their history.

## This new specialist history area has been created to

- Acknowledge cultural and sensitive pasts.
- Provide a discreet location for research.
- Improve access to diverse resources.

# Education and Life Long Learning

The strategic focus of the Education and Life Long Learning Coordinator is to connect the Museum with stories and programs that stimulate the imaginations of the young and young at heart. With a qualified teacher on staff, the programs meet our strategic goal to share knowledge and provide skills-based learning and cultural experiences that build connections to community. Our programs are aligned to the primary and secondary curriculum, and we have extended our reach to Vocational Educational and Training students, who undertake Certificate based study.

Programs we deliver through our education and lifelong learning strategy include school incursions to the Museum, History in a Trunk lectures, History on the Move Trailer excursions to schools, and our own school holiday program. We also have Museum offerings of audio guides, colouring in competitions, super sleuths and temporary gallery activities. The Cairns Museum is a leading educational experience for everyone!

# Our Financial Capability

The Cairns Historical Society has over last twelve months demonstrated a strong commitment to growth, organisational renewal and strong fiscal management.

Our financial capability is underpinned by a conservative approach to decision making, confidence in financial efficacy and a positive attitude to managing risks as well as looking for opportunities.

## Our Priorities 2023-2024

With forward thinking vision and a targeted strategic plan for the future, the Society is well placed as a leading community organisation. Our priorities for 2023-2024 include:

- Align and implement a clear pathway for growth through Five Strategic Goals objectives which underpin the activities of the Society: Tropical Collections, Digital Gateways, Engagement and Learning, Governance, and Growth and Development.
- Maintain core budget expectations in CRC Agreements and explore alternative financial growth areas through grants, sponsorship and patron donations.
- Investigate and fundraise for a new Collection Management System.
- Increase digital capabilities through investment in equipment and software.
- Complete Spatial Renewal Collections Store and Edmonton shed offsite storage facility.
- Maintain and build partnerships with community groups and tourism operators.
- Continue to deliver community engagement to broader audiences.
- Increase member benefits and accessibility.
- Provide a forward projecting organisational culture.

## Grants and Sponsorship

### Grants

Over the 2022-2023 year, three grants were applied for and other fundraising avenues explored including Corporate Sponsorship and Patronage. The Society also received a number of donations and in-kind support.

Alternative sources of financial supplement remain a crucial aspect of our business model to ensure continuity of Museum operations and provide care for our significant Collection. The Society understands that these are challenging times, and it wholeheartedly appreciates any contribution made, small or large donation, in-kind support, or a donation of one's time.

# Financials

The Society's financial performance has been strong and steady; buoyed by a positive tourism and cruise ship bounce, and a strong national market.

## Income

We saw an increase in overall income of \$178,948, up 33.9% to the previous year. This increase was primarily due to higher visitor numbers and an increase in CRC R&P funding.

## Expenses

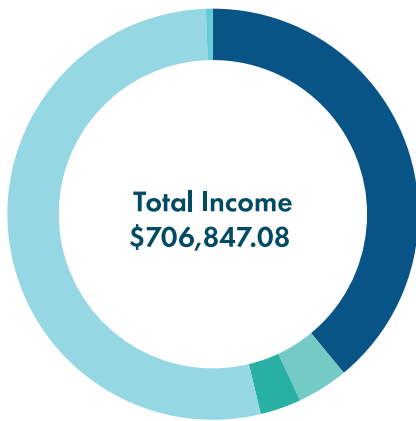
We had a decrease in expenses of \$45,681, down 6.56% to the previous year. This decrease is primarily due to reduced employee costs.

## Assets

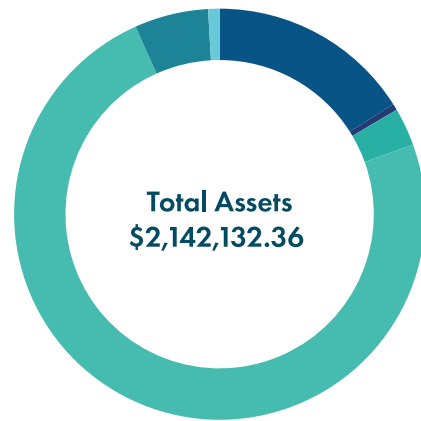
Total assets were valued at \$2.14 million, which amounted to an increase of approximately \$10,000, up 0.47% to the previous year.

## Liabilities

Total liabilities were valued at \$1.64 million, a decrease of approximately \$47,000, down 2.79% to the previous year. This decrease is primarily due to reduced employee costs and creditors.
